






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A Word from the Board of Trustees

Glory to Jesus Christ! Glory Forever!

When I see the work of St Vladimir's Seminary, when I meet the students and interact with the faculty and staff, it gives me hope for the future. I am constantly reminded of this by people like Seminary President Fr Chad Hatfield, the entire faculty and staff, and all of our students who have made great sacrifices to build up the Church. This reality, along with my love for Christ, is what inspires me to give of my time and money to the mission of St Vladimir's.

When I decided to accept the role as the executive chair of the Board of Trustees five years ago, I did so because I realized that in order to grow our tiny percentage of Orthodox Christians here in America into a major movement of Christ-followers, we need great theological education and great pastoral leadership. I got involved with St Vladimir's Seminary in order to affect the quality of theological education for those who are entering the priesthood, who will in turn raise up the next generation of Orthodox Christians worldwide.

We are living in a time when Truth has become individualistic. In our current cultural landscape, everyone defines "truth" for themselves. You often hear people say: "I'm living my truth," or "That's your truth." But we, as Christians, believe that Christ is the only Way, Truth, and Life. God is our source of Truth and we bear witness to that Truth. Today, more than ever, we need priests who are committed to the Orthodox faith, who can go out and not just be culturally sensitive and relevant, but also wholly faithful to that Truth and proclaim it.

By God's grace, St Vladimir's Seminary and the Orthodox Church are on the cusp of enormous growth and expansion. There are hundreds of people coming into the Church from various backgrounds and belief systems and are looking for Truth. As a theological institution, St Vladimir's is tasked with passing on the Tradition that was passed on to us from Christ and his Saints, and we are careful to remain faithful stewards of this holy task. We are carrying out this mission by helping form the theological understanding of these young priests and lay leaders, so that when they go out and preach the gospel, people can have confidence they're being faithful to that Truth.

Some members of our larger Church community have raised the question of "Why does St Vladimir's

need to grow and expand? Why can't St Vladimir's just focus on training the best priests possible?" My first answer is this: you don't have to compromise quality to grow. My second answer is that if you look at the number of priests retiring, and the number of priests we will need in the future to serve the beautiful surge of people coming to the Church, it's clear that we need a plan for growth. We have to get ahead of the pending vacancy of priests. If we are going to be faithful to the Great Commission, to go and make disciples of all nations, we need priests who are educated and skilled to go into places where we don't have Orthodox churches and start missions; we need priests who are able to revitalize dying parishes; we need priests to shepherd existing parishes with love and Truth. Ultimately, the answer to this question of "why grow?" is the mandate of the Great Commission from Christ Himself.

Over the next year, and beyond, St Vladimir's priorities will be focused on preparation and prayerful strategy for the future. The Board of Trustees, alongside Fr Chad Hatfield and Dr Alex Tudorie, and all the senior faculty and staff, are committed to building a solid foundation and creating a clear vision for the future of St Vladimir's.

And we need your help! We need an army of people praying for the Seminary. We need people who are willing to serve as trustees. We need quality staff willing to do the work. We need men and women willing to be trained to be future priests and lay leaders. And we need financial support. It's more expensive to run a seminary than I would have ever imagined before I joined the Board of Trustees.

There are so many needs in the world. You can support causes that feed the hungry, clothe the naked, minister to people in prison. And ALL of those are *valid and needed* ministries. But the thing I love about giving to St Vladimir's Seminary is that it's a gift that keeps on giving. When you invest in a priest, that investment pays dividends for forty to fifty years. Saint Vladimir's is one of the few ministries that pays those kind of long-term dividends. From an investor's standpoint, an investment in St Vladimir's is one of the best investments that you can make for the future





These things are simply not possible if we do nothing or just patch things up here and there, though we diligently explored that very option. But we have come to a clear path forward. A modern campus will give us more financial flexibility to build on the already immense legacy of St Vladimir's Seminary, and transform it into something even more valuable for Orthodoxy in the twenty-first century.

I hope you share our excitement at the possibilities that lie ahead of us and remember the people and work of St Vladimir's Seminary in your prayers. To make this dream a reality, we need your prayers and generosity more than ever.

A Word from the Academic Dean

Becoming a Nexus of Orthodox Christian Scholarship & Education

A new hybrid program for remote students, a forthcoming doctoral degree, and the addition of renowned scholars as full-time faculty—St Vladimir's Seminary is moving forward!

By the grace of God, there have been significant academic developments at St Vladimir's Seminary over the past year.

These are exciting steps that will make a positive impact on Orthodox theological education and expand its reach to more people and parishes in North America and internationally. The Seminary is truly moving forward.

New degree concentrations in our Master of Arts program are a major part of the Seminary's expanding impact. One of these concentrations makes access to theological education available to a greater number of emerging and developing church leaders, in particular to lay leaders: a hybrid program in Orthodox Christian leadership for remote, part-time students. The new M.A. in Orthodox Christian Leadership Studies meets a growing need to educate Orthodox Christians who cannot physically move to the Seminary. It will help equip leaders who serve their parishes, schools, non-profits, and workplaces with servant leadership formation and practice. The new program begins this fall, and is the fruit of an excellent collaboration with the Orthodox Christian Leadership Initiative (OCLI), for which we are most thankful. The degree concentration became the fourth within the M.A. degree program, joining concentrations in General Theological Studies, Theological Scholarship and Research, and Sacred Arts. Together, these concentrations allow us to provide even more specialized education and training for the many and diverse vocations and needs of the Church.

The Seminary is also in the process of building and seeking accreditation for a doctoral degree. The future Ph.D. in Orthodox Christian Studies will

offer something not widely available at present: a doctoral program that would draw on the strengths of our faculty and take full advantage of the Orthodox liturgical and communal life as found at St Vladimir's Seminary.

The faculty and the academic life here continue to grow stronger with the addition of more noted Orthodox scholars, both as full-time faculty members and visiting scholars. The renowned biblical scholar **Dr Michael Legaspi** will join the faculty this fall as tenured associate professor of Old Testament. Dr Legaspi's hire was the result of an international, highly competitive process to recruit the best Orthodox scholars and teachers throughout the world. During the past academic year, St Vladimir's Seminary hosted the Rev. Dr Silviu Bunta, a specialist of the Hebrew Bible and Second Temple Judaism from the University of Dayton, as scholar in residence for the fall semester; in the spring term iconographer *Dr George Kordis* joined us as artist in residence. The scholar- and artist-in-residence programs will continue in the upcoming academic year with The Very Rev. Dr Maximos Constas of Hellenic College-Holy Cross and *Dr Alexander Lingas* of Capella Romana. It is important for our students to benefit from the continued on-campus presence of renowned scholars from both within and outside the Seminary.

There have been further developments at the Father Georges Florovsky Library—a key piece in attracting students, top faculty, and visiting scholars to St Vladimir's. We have added a new academic database and completed major and needed work on our collection through the help of Backstage Library Works. Of note, the Florovsky Library has been selected by the Orthodox Church in America to house its historical archive. We will continue to invest in adding databases and updating our collections to ensure the Library is the best-possible instrument for seminarians, doctoral students, faculty, alumni, and visiting scholars.

We have put our successful student graduate conferences on hold for the moment—but only so that we can work on expanding it to include not only St Vladimir's seminarians but also students from Holy Cross (Brookline, MA), St Tikhon's (South Canaan,

PA), and Holy Trinity (Jordanville, NY) Orthodox seminaries.

This October we will inaugurate the annual St Vladimir's Symposia. Our first, focusing on liturgical theology, had to be postponed last year due to the pandemic, but we are happy to report it will take place this year. Final dates and details are forthcoming. These symposia will bring to campus the best scholars from the fields chosen each year.

Finally, we are delighted by the positive response to our recent refresh of the *St Vladimir's Theological Quarterly* (SVTQ). Building from the diligent and excellent work of previous editor Professor Emeritus Dr Paul Meyendorff, we have seen an encouraging numbers of subscriptions and scholarly submissions to the *Quarterly* (e.g., on average, for every ten excellent articles published in just one issue of SVTQ, 120 articles are put through our rigorous, doubleblind peer-reviewed process!). And it should be said that the *Quarterly* remains very, very reasonably priced for a highly academic journal.

I am pleased to see what I envisioned at the start of my tenure as academic dean gradually becoming reality: St Vladimir's as a nexus of Orthodox scholarship, where we see a cluster of Orthodox scholars collaborating with each other, serving the students, and attracting other scholars; and a place where each seminarian is given the tools and environment they need to help realize their potential and calling as servants for Christ's Church. But our work continues, and we continue to give glory to God—"for it is God who works in us to will and to act in order to fulfill his good purpose" (Phil 2.13).


New Master of Arts Degree Concentrations


Orthodox Christian Leadeship Studies & Sacred Arts

On Mission to Indonesia

The Ministry of Alumnus Dn Philip McClanahan

The Rev. Dn Philip McClanahan and his family have begun building support for their ministry in Indonesia.

Deacon Philip and Kristiana, along with their three children Irene (7), Simon (2), and Miriam (5 months), are preparing to travel to the city of Medan through the Orthodox Christian Mission Center (OCMC). There Dn Philip will lecture at the St Paul Theological School and teach youth at local Orthodox schools under His Eminence, Metropolitan Konstantinos of Singapore.

"Having OCMC missionaries on the ground will greatly contribute to the efforts of the growing Church in Indonesia," read a statement about the McClanahan family from OCMC. "His education and skills will make him a great asset for the St Paul Theological School in Medan and the local Church."

The McClanahans will become the first missionaries sent by OCMC to Indonesia.

"Before I was Orthodox I did some mission work in the Middle East," said Dn Philip. "Then I went on a long spiritual quest and entered into Orthodoxy in 2010. "When I met my wife one of the things we had in common was an interest in missions. We even contacted OCMC prior to coming to seminary. So it's been a number of years in the making."


Deacon Philip graduated from St Vladimir's Seminary with a Master of Divinity degree in 2021. As a seminarian he led the St Innocent Mission Society student interest group. Among other undertakings, he helped organize an effort to assist the Orthodox Diocese of Gulu and Eastern Uganda in 2020.

Where Seekers Find Rest

The Ministry of Alumnus Fr Christopher Foley

The generosity of donors like you has enabled trained priests to bring about transformation in individuals, families, and communities everywhere—including Holy Cross Mission in High Point, NC.

Saint Vladimir's Seminary Alumnus Fr Christopher Foley (class of 2006), the priest at Holy Cross, says the mission parish has recently experienced a great increase of chrismations and baptisms.

We have people from all walks of life and all stages in their spiritual journey. Many are people who left the church years ago and are now finding Orthodoxy through online Orthodox talks and live streams.

During the pandemic Fr Christopher's parish, like many others, experienced a drop in attendance at the beginning but is now seeing an influx of seekers coming to the Church.

Many people have been so miserable in their search for truth over the years, and when they



find Orthodoxy, it's like they can finally rest.

Our parish is eighty percent converts, so we are especially welcoming and hospitable to these seekers—we all know what it was like going to an Orthodox church for the first time and want to make sure that these people feel welcomed.

Father Christopher has spent the last fifteen years putting what he learned at St Vladimir's into action. He's developed a six-week inquirer's class for those wanting to learn about Orthodoxy, as well as a twelve-class catechumen course for those who are ready to convert. There is a constant stream of twenty catechumens on average taking this course, and Fr Christopher recently baptized and chrismated fifteen people!

I rely on SVS Press books like For the Life of the World, The Incarnate God, The Living God, Sweeter than Honey, and many from the Popular Patristics Series. These texts are immensely helpful in teaching seekers, but my time at St Vladimir's has prepared me for things that I could never have learned in a book. Being immersed in the culture of St Vladimir's taught me to have a vision for the beauty of the services, serving well, and working

hard to create that same beauty in my parish. My academic classes serve as a lifeline for answering people's deeper theological questions—I may not know the answers but I know where to point people. Most of all, the pastoral care I experienced is what I lean on the most. Many people say that St Vladimir's is where the "academics" go and the "pastors" go elsewhere, but that wasn't true for me. Saint Vladimir's gave me the pastoral tools that I use now through my classes, through confession and one-on-one time with my confessor, the faculty, and the other students. You cannot learn these things in books or just in classes, and certainly not online.

Your faithful support provides the tools Fr Christopher and other alumni need to grow disciples of the Risen Christ and inspire them to participate as one Body, united. Because of you, St Vladimir's continues to prepare men and women to proclaim the joy of our Savior's resurrection to the world.

From an early age, I remember going everywhere with my dad, The Very Rev. Fr Stephen Loposky, ministering to people through house blessings, sick calls, serving the liturgy. I grew up quite literally in the Church, watching my parents serving and loving people as priest and priest wife —it's what fostered my earliest desires and calling to the priesthood and service to the Church.

I wasn't exactly sure how my calling to serve would crystallize. In my heart, I knew I wanted to serve. Attending St Vladimir's was the next step in exploring that calling.

After my first year here, the most important thing I have learned is obedience. You have to be obedient to

the Church and what the Church teaches, and on the meal crew, serving in the chapel, or working in the library, you have to learn how to be obedient both to your classmates and to your professors and the staff. That has never and will never change in the Church—there is always a mutual obedience. You have responsibility to others and they have responsibility to you.

Before I got to St Vladimir's I thought I knew exactly what I was going to learn. But I am learning so much more than I could have imagined, and I could not have learned it anywhere else. Everything at St Vladimir's is formation—the education, the community, the friendships, the mentorships, the services. I am grateful to be here, at a place with such a wonderful history, and I'm grateful for the privilege of learning here.

From Women's Studies to Monasticism

As an undergraduate, majoring in women's studies, I felt a strong pull toward the Church. I had begun to realize that the world's remedy for the identity crisis that mankind is currently facing is horribly flawed, and that the only true remedy is in Christ and his Church.

During my studies and planning for the future, I also realized that, for me, there was nothing outside of the Church that would be satisfying. I was looking for something that would consume my whole life into the life of the Church—which is what ultimately led me to monasticism.

After seeking guidance from my spiritual father, I decided that I needed a stronger theological foundation, for my own spiritual benefit and in order to serve others better. The knowledge I have gained while at St Vladimir's Seminary has helped in every aspect of my life, first and foremost my spirituality and my understanding about spiritual truths. I am learning how to better understand the condition of the world and the people of the world—which is preparing me to minister to people and to do the work of the Kingdom of God.

Just as in the monastery, St Vladimir's has also taught me the importance of being spiritually formed in a community. I am being molded by this community and learning to find my identity within our Church community at large. The friendships I have made in this community, with people on the same journey and discovering the same things that I am, has been a great source of comfort and joy.

A theological foundation is important for *any* position within Christianity—no matter what that position is. People will always want to ask you things and all believers need to be equipped to answer those questions in a deep and profound way. I am grateful for my time at St Vladimir's where I am building this foundation for my future ministry as a monastic.

No Other Life

Our story is more of a slow burn than a sudden spark. My wife and I both knew from the beginning that the priesthood might be our path someday, and we never let go of that feeling over the years.

For twenty years, I worked in the IT industry, and spent most of those same years directing and arranging music for parish choirs. About four years ago, I was ordained a deacon at Holy Trinity Orthodox Church in Pottstown, PA. It was then I realized just how much we needed to live a life of service to the Church; there was no other life we

could possibly live. After Alexandra's career change to become a midwife, and our second oldest finished high school, we knew it was time.

I cannot say enough how difficult it is for an established family to make a leap of faith and come to St Vladimir's, or any seminary. We all pull ourselves out of our former lives by the roots, and pray that there is good soil to be re-planted in. Many families give up half their income to come; others nearly all, making month-to-month budgeting difficult.

Seminary is not just an academic exercise; at St Vladimir's, it is an immersive life meant to shape the people that will serve the faithful in some way. The donations from donors like you are often the lifelines that make it possible to forge ahead and live seminary life fully. Every corner of St Vladimir's is committed to forming the whole person. A successful seminarian strives to hold the discipline of learning, the dedication to the Temple, the care for our loved ones, and the care of oneself, in balance. We are learning how to see the Scriptures as a living icon, and how we might impart that view to the world uniquely as Orthodox Christians.

SVS Press Author Spotlight Money & Salvation

Dr Andrew Geleris

The purpose of my upcoming book, *Money & Salvation: An Invitation to the Good Way*, published by SVS Press, is to encourage a restoration of a scriptural and patristic perspective regarding the topic of money within our churches.

Today many Orthodox Christians, including bishops and priests, feel acutely uncomfortable discussing financial issues in church for a variety of valid historical and pastoral reasons. In addition, materialistic greed is such a rampant force in American culture that we fear contaminating the purity of our worship by allowing the topic of "filthy lucre" into our midst. Money is often considered an "unspiritual" topic in contrast to truly "spiritual" topics such as love, forgiveness, obedience, prayer, fasting, and sexual purity.

In contrast to our extreme reluctance to discuss money in church, the Gospels record Jesus teaching far more frequently and intensely about the "unspiritual" topic of finances than all the "spiritual" topics that dominate our teaching. Why has such a stunning divergence developed between our teaching priorities and those of the gospel?

It is because we view the topic of money through the lens of a dramatically different spiritual paradigm than Jesus used. On those rare occasions when we do, reluctantly, discuss finances in church this generally occurs in the context of gentle invitations for the faithful to prayerfully consider giving to

various extremely worthy causes such as supporting the annual church budget, acquiring a new icon, repairing a leaky roof, or helping poor people. Since the purpose of such discussions is to raise money for ministry this is "ministry-centric" fundraising.

Jesus, however, never talked about giving money for the sake of ministry, including helping the poor. Instead, every financial discussion that he ever had emphasized the importance of using our money for the sake of achieving the salvation of our souls. This is true always and without exception. Thus, his financial discussions were "soul-centric."

This book is an effort to describe why restoring a soul-centric scriptural and patristic phronema to the Church is important and what it might look like. It includes discussions of why almsgiving is essential for our salvation, the powerful spiritual mystery that underlies sacrificial giving, the purpose of wealth, the enormous personal spiritual value of tithing, the importance of parish financial priorities, and a soul-centric approach to fundraising. It also discusses non-financial aspects of godly sacrificial living.

Imagine the tsunami of spiritual blessing that would overwhelm the lives of our people and churches if most of our faithful simply started tithing to their local parishes (Malachi 3.10). And imagine the powerful spiritual impact that might occur if parishes used these additional funds for the support of youth ministries, seminaries, Orthodox schools, charities, mission churches, and compassionate outreaches to the needy.

A Pioneering Orthodox Leader Baptized at Seminary

Meet Donor & Alumna Hollie Benton

Hollie Benton (SVOTS' class of 1999) has served as executive director of the Orthodox Christian Leadership Initiative (OCLI) since September of 2019. Her time at Seminary was uniquely life-changing—she was baptized at the Seminary's Three Hierarchs Chapel and met her future husband, fellow 1999 graduate Rich Benton, at St Vladimir's!

Just this past September, Hollie spearheaded another successful National Orthodox Advanced Leadership Conference hosted by OCLI and St Vladimir's, bringing together emerging and seasoned leaders from across North America—clergy and laity, men and women, younger and older—for the fifth year running. Collaboration between OCLI and St Vladimir's again bore fruit this past spring with the development of the Seminary's Master of Arts Degree Concentration in Orthodox Christian Leadership Studies, a hybrid program designed for remote, parttime students.

Hollie took time out of her busy schedule to share her thoughts on what it means to be a servant of Christ, and why she and Rich continue to support St Vladimir's Seminary.

What did you take away from your time at SVOTS?

I experienced this paradigm shift: while I had freedom to choose or reject Christianity, the rite of baptism shows that my choice is insignificant compared to the Lord who chooses to show great mercy and the forgiveness of sins. I can only submit to his will found in his commandments. Everything was reframed for me so that I saw myself as under that authority. What we hear from the world right now is "You be YOU, find YOUR voice, dig down deep into what you want and who you are." But God provides all that we need through his life-giving Word if we'd only submit. Everyone is a slave to something. If you can name what you are afraid of, what you are

angry at, what you desire, or what keeps you up at night, those are your masters. By contrast, Christ's yoke is easy and his burden is light. So why not serve him rather than be enslaved by our fears and our own egos? At St Vladimir's, I began to learn what it means to function as a servant in God's household laid out clearly in Fr Paul Tarazi's classes.

Why do you and Rich give to SVOTS?

We feel it's our responsibility. We need to raise up men and women who are educated, who take Scripture seriously, and who take their ministry seriously. It's important to support those who are giving of their time and energy to be educated. Why not support that work and carry the burden together?



From your perspective, what is most needed in the Church today, and what part does SVOTS play in that?

At St Vladimir's, there is a lot of emphasis on forming leadership. We are all called to be servants of God—not just the priest who is our "stand-in servant." We have a duty to the greatest commandments—loving God and neighbor. Christian leadership is not about developing personal influence and authority; it's about submitting to the ONE Leader. God the Father is the only true authority and his Word has the only lasting influence. The only kind of Christian leader is one who serves to carry out his Father's will just as the Son of God, Jesus Christ, demonstrates.

And by loving God, we learn what it means to submit to one another in love. Quite intentionally we called one of our OCLI programs DOULOS, which means "slave" or "servant" in Greek. Every time we receive communion, we are reminded that the doulos tou theou, or "the servant of God receives the body and blood of Jesus Christ." In order to submit to God's instruction we need to turn our ears toward it; people need to be encouraged to pay attention to Scripture proclaimed in liturgical services. You go to Scripture so that it can search you and form you. It's back to basics, isn't it? We hear "leadership" and we think of hip motivational speakers and innovation, but really it's all laid out for us already: submission to him and to one another in love. When we allow the Scriptures to search us and form us, it's so powerful. Imperfections bubble up and if we have the humility to acknowledge and confess them we can function properly as the Body of Christ.

Can you say a word for the value of seminary for those who aren't on the ordination track?

I can speak for myself, since my undergrad was in philosophy and music and as a woman I wasn't preparing for ordination. For me St Vladimir's was all about the academic rigor, working through difficult texts, learning how to lay out the arguments, and seeking the Lord's instruction. And because of the hectic schedule, it's also a time when you learn how to keep your priorities straight and stay balanced.

When you are formed within the St Vladimir's community you learn to understand people a lot. Somewhat paradoxically, I did well at my corporate job due to my seminary education and I succeeded in corporate management because of my seminary experience. In our years at St Vladimir's, we didn't have the luxury of asking, "what do I feel like doing right now? Who do I feel like loving?" The people skills I picked up at seminary have been invaluable in both my corporate and ministry work.

At St Vladimir's I gained a deep sense of what's important: focus, compassion, worship, Scripture, and love in service to God and neighbor.
