A Word from the Board of Trustees

Bringing the Truth to the World



Dear Friends of St Vladimir's Seminary,

We are deeply grateful for your unwavering support of our beloved St Vladimir's Seminary. Your prayers, generosity, and advocacy are the pillars that uphold our evangelical mission. Without you, we would not have been able to achieve all that we have.

St Vladimir's Seminary, in its training of Orthodox clergy and lay leaders, SVS Press, and theological and academic excellence, is the shining light on the hill, witnessing to the Truth. And we have much work to do.

The extraordinary number of seekers and catechumens that our parishes are experiencing is a great joy and blessing but also a manifestation of a society that has lost its way. Moral relativism and the rejection of the traditional understanding of family and community, truth, beauty, goodness, and right and wrong have left so many sinking with no firm footing to orient their lives. In coming to Orthodoxy, these seekers

are looking for and finding solid ground. That solid ground is the Truth, and the Truth is the gospel of Jesus Christ.

To bring that Truth to those who are hungering for reality, we need more priests. Even before this evangelical awakening, the Church was facing an impending critical priest shortage at a time of unprecedented societal division and upheaval. Our priests will have to speak to contemporary issues of economics, poverty, environment, gender, marriage, and sexuality. The Church must wade into the heated waters of the culture wars, not to take sides but to bring peace by framing and explaining these controversies within the unchanging Orthodox Tradition.

The seminary has much work to do but faces operational challenges. The seminary chronically suffers from inadequate financial resources, resulting in budget deficits that are slowly consuming our endowment. The high cost of living and housing expenses in our location of Westchester County exacerbate our financial difficulties. Our beautiful campus is aging, and projected maintenance costs are significant. The seminary's legacy data systems for finance, academics, advancement, and SVS Press are in need of updating and integration.

Still, we have much to be thankful for and to celebrate at St Vladimir's Seminary. Over the last several years, the seminary has grown the student body, filled out a renowned faculty, and strengthened its worldwide reputation as a premier center of Orthodox education. Because of St Vladimir's Seminary's educational and academic excellence, broad outreach through SVS Press, and pan-Orthodox ethos, the seminary is uniquely positioned to serve the Church across our many jurisdictional and national boundaries. These accomplishments speak to the tireless work of our staff and faculty,

commanded to gather those who wish to preserve and promote Orthodox Christianity in sacred spaces for spiritual formation, and to band together as a "city on a hill" that cannot be hidden.


The Orthodox Church is experiencing a growth explosion. Since the pandemic, there has been a remarkable number of catechumens entering into all North American jurisdictions. We find these individuals are mostly male and between the ages of eighteen and forty. They are wrestling with their own mortality and have turned to the Orthodox Faith to find solace.

It is clear to me that people are hungry for God's Truth, to know more about the Orthodox Christian Faith, and to walk as children of light.

We have not only experienced an influx of new catechumens, but those interested in ministry service, as well. Classes resumed in August and thirty new seminarians joined us. We have a total of ninety-three seminarians living on campus from eighteen jurisdictions and ten countries. Forty-eight families with forty-four children also live, study, worship, and play here.

A Word from the Academic Dean & Interim President

Renewing Our Focus



The seminary now finds itself in a process of transition that will eventually lead to the selection of new leadership. It is always difficult and challenging when a long-tenured and respected leader, such as Fr Chad Hatfield, who has worked tirelessly and faithfully for the Church and the seminary, moves on. We find ourselves at a crossroads as we look ahead to new leadership. It is not the seminary's first such moment, nor will it be the last; but we do have the opportunity for a fresh look at how best to do our work as an academic institution at the service of the Church. We find ourselves in a position to recommit to a model of teaching in service to the Church that is Christ-centered, student-focused, and education-driven.

Christ-centered


Student-focused

Ultimately, St Vladimir's Seminary was founded to serve the Orthodox Church by serving the students entrusted to us for theological education and spiritual formation. These seminarians, and the potential they hold for the Church today and the Church tomorrow, are the purpose of all of our education, formation, training, and research. The testimony of our graduates in North America and all over the world is humbling and encouraging: our alumni and current seminarians love the seminary and value their experience. Our ongoing life at the seminary entails a constant recommitment to our students and their formation. Every year brings new challenges—the past year was no exception—that invite us to learn afresh how to be responsive to the community and enrich the student experience, the better to cultivate the spiritual and pastoral gifts our graduates will offer to the Church and the world.

Education-driven

St Vladimir's Seminary is not an institution with an academic department. The seminary is by nature an educational institution in service of the Church. Every one of its constituent bodies and stakeholders is vital to its existence, and they are mutually dependent upon each other. 

faculty are central to the seminary's core mission of teaching and forming men and women who, in turn, will be in positions to support the teaching, preaching, and serving ministries of the Church. In this way, the seminary's educational priorities can be fulfilled by a team that works collaboratively in the service of Christ and His gospel.

Christ-centered, student-focused, and education-driven—we entrust ourselves to the prayers and concrete help of our donors, alumni, and friends who support the formation of our future priests, lay leaders, and scholars. "A Real Spiritual Father"

Fr Chad Hatfield at St Vladimir's Seminary

"He has been a real spiritual father," said a graduating seminarian as he introduced his family to Fr Chad Hatfield following St Vladimir's Seminary's 2024 Commencement in May.

Recalling the moment, tears welled up in Fr Chad's eyes.

"That really meant so much. How much more could a priest and leader of a seminary be honored?"

With retirement nearing after seventeen years leading the seminary, first as chancellor and then president and CEO, you wouldn't know it by glancing at Fr Chad's travel and work schedule—even leading up to his final day at the office, just a mere few weeks away.

On a sweltering day in June, the Very Rev. Dr Chad Hatfield keeps himself as busy as ever, as passionate about the mission of St Vladimir's Seminary as ever, as concerned as ever with the seminarians still entrusted to his care. But that should come as no surprise to anyone who has studied or worked at St Vladimir's with Fr Chad. His internal compass has always pointed unwaveringly toward each and every seminarian; driving him each year was his relentless dedication to make each seminarian's experience as complete and transformational as possible. And if something wasn't as good as it could be, he wanted to find a solution.

"Fr Chad Hatfield is a visionary of the highest order, because he is, above all things, a pastor. He loves the people whom he shepherds," said the Rev. Photius Avant, a graduate of the seminary (M.Div., '11) and rector of St Sava Orthodox Church in Allen, TX. "As a seminarian, I felt sometimes that



almost nobody cared about my family or me. But I knew that Fr Chad cared about my wife, my children, and me.

"It is because of him that St Vladimir's is far more family friendly than it once was. It is because of him that many seminarians think positively about their time at St Vladimir's. He has done so much for Orthodox Christianity in this country, and he could have done more. His shoes will be truly difficult to fill."

Many things were accomplished at the seminary under Fr Chad's leadership—the expansion of the faculty and of academic programs, the enhancement of campus facilities, the strengthening of the staff and administration, the building up of St Vladimir's Seminary (SVS) Press and widening of its reach, the launch of St Vladimir's Online School of Theology, the expansion and development of the seminary's Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE) program, the reinforcement of the seminary's financial foundation, the implementation of the tuition-free program to remove financial burdens and barriers keeping prospective seminarians from enrolling—and all were done with the care and formation of seminarians at the forefront of his vision. If something was good for the seminarians, good for the faculty, good for his

staff, Fr Chad would work to make it happen. And like any good leader and spiritual father, Fr Chad empowered people and believed in them.

"There was no suggested project, no matter how far-fetched it may have sounded, that he didn't support," explained seminary Professor of Systematic Theology and Director of the Institute of Sacred Arts Dr Peter C. Bouteneff. "I recall how, when [former SVOTS music professor] Nicholas

Reeves and I approached him with the idea of bringing Arvo Pärt and the Estonian orchestra and choir to Carnegie Hall, he not only said 'Absolutely!' but—within a matter of weeks—he got on a plane with us to Estonia to meet with the composer and begin laying plans.

"We're all deeply grateful for your support, Fr Chad! You've helped us to do many beautiful things."

Fr Chad's wife Matushka Thekla, an iconographer and church musician, has always shared his love for the seminary community and the Church. Indeed, it seems almost impossible to imagine St Vladimir's Seminary without both their warmth and smiles (with the past few years accompanied by their indomitable pup, Fergus!) just around the next corner of campus, in the classroom, or graciously hosting seminarians and families at their home next to the seminary. They worked together to leave no stone unturned in trying to create a campus environment that could address a wide scope of needs for every member of the seminary community.

As an example, in 2010 Fr Chad and Mka Thekla transformed what was then the "spouses' group" on campus into the St Juliana's Society (SJS)—named after St Juliana Lazarevo, a sixteenth-century woman known for her mercy, motherly kindness, and her continual ascetic

efforts—and began hosting wives of seminarians at their house. When the Hatfields arrived at St Vladimir's, women on campus and wives of seminarians generally felt they were at the bottom rung of campus life and had no voice. Mka Thekla listened to their frustrated laments at her first meeting of the "spouses' group" before being asked to take it over. She was determined to bring positive change to the group.

"We wanted to offer our future clergy wives, in an intentional way, the tools they would need to face the demanding situations they will encounter as they share in the ministry of their husbands," she said. They continued to host the SJS meetings into the most recent academic year.

"I always looked forward to our St Juliana Society meetings at the Hatfields' cozy home," said Khouria Megan Elizabeth Gilbert, who lived on campus with her seminarian husband, now the Rev. Anthony Gilbert (M.Div., '23), and their family. "We had a large spectrum of speakers ranging from seasoned clergy wives to bishops, speaking on topics such as marriage, raising families, parish life, iconography, and tools to help take care of our own and our families' physical, mental, and spiritual health. Gathering together in this warm and trusted space, we could open up our hearts and share our lives, our struggles,

and our hopes together. It bonded us together as a community and also nourished and equipped us as we stepped out into our next chapter.

"One night Mka Thekla herself was our special speaker. She shared about her and Fr Chad's very adventurous life that comes from so fully serving Christ. I will never forget her words, encouraging us to remember that whatever we may encounter in our lives, always 'listen quietly and pray loudly."

Whether hosting SJS or sponsoring numerous student-interest groups on campus, Fr Chad and Mka Thekla would lend a helping hand to whatever was happening at the seminary. This was in addition to Fr Chad's duties as president, rector of the chapel, director of the Master of Divinity (M.Div.) program, professor of pastoral theology, and series editor of SVS Press's Profiles and Missions and Evangelism series. He would find a way to make time for people, even though he had precious little.

"Fr Chad always makes the time—I could always go to him for guidance of any kind," said Ann Sanchez, who served as Fr Chad's administrative assistant during his entire tenure at the seminary.

"I can't emphasize enough how truly blessed I feel to have been able to work with Fr Chad. I ad-

mire the priest that he is, his teaching skills, his care for the students, his mentorship as a father confessor to so many, making sure the chapel was just right before a feast day. He has been so dedicated to the seminary, gave his all, and worked so hard during his years here," she continued. "He is just so well rounded, and he could switch hats in an instant from priest and spiritual father to president and administrator—whatever was needed at that moment he could do and do well. It was truly remarkable to witness working with him all these years.

"I am so thankful for Fr Chad and Mka Thekla. They both have worked so hard for this place, and they will be missed."

Despite frequent pleas from Ann and other staff members over the years to "take it easy," Fr Chad worked long hours in his office, almost always staying late even after everyone else had gone home. His sense of commitment as a servant of the Church seemingly wouldn't let him take a breather, even sometimes to the detriment of his physical health. (Knee surgery a few years ago is probably the only thing that slowed him down for several days, but even then I personally saw him working from home during recovery—and heard that Mka Thekla had scolded him for doing so.)

It was his sense of duty as a priest of the Church that brought him to St Vladimir's Seminary in the first place.

"When I was asked on two separate occasions to have my name submitted to [SVOTS'] dean search, I gave a firm 'no' each time," he recalled. "I was just getting a feel for the unique approach needed to teach native Alaskans [as dean of St Herman's Seminary in Alaska], and I was committed to my work there. I wasn't hunting for the job at St Vladimir's Seminary. But I ended up being

one of two finalists for dean [in 2007], and in the end the board came up with the double-headed eagle model of chancellor and dean with Fr John Behr. Mka Thekla and I came really as an act of obedience. We felt this was for the Church."

Fr Chad's determination to be a faithful servant of Christ had already taken him across North America and even abroad. A graduate of Nashotah House in Wisconsin ('78 and '88) and Pittsburgh Theological Seminary ('01), Fr's ministry in the Episcopal Church took him, Mka Thekla, and their young son Jason to South Africa in the 1980s to serve in the mission field during Apartheid. (Their second son, Sean, was born there.) Despite the risk of drawing the ire of the Afrikaans government—which sent spies to Fr Chad's parish to ensure they weren't allowing non-whites into the church—he wouldn't compromise his ministry to help whomever God had placed in front of him. He taught black and Indian students at an all-girls school. When he and Mka Thekla met a black South African who was interested in the priesthood but had nowhere to study, they took the bright young man into their home so he could receive instruction from Fr Chad (at the risk of deportation for them and imprisonment for the young student). After returning to the US, Fr Chad and Mka Thekla were eventually received into the Orthodox Church. Fr Chad was ordained as a priest by Bishop Basil

(Essey) of the Antiochian Orthodox Christian Archdiocese of North America in 1994, and went on to found two Orthodox parishes: All Saints in Salina, KS, and St Mary Magdelene in Manhattan, KS. He then was asked to take up the deanship at St Herman's Seminary from 2002 until 2007, when he joined St Vladimir's Seminary.

His travels didn't stop. (They still haven't—he is honoring a speaking commitment that will keep him away from his office even on his final day as president of the seminary!) As chancellor and later president/CEO, Fr Chad hit the road often, to fundraise and promote the seminary, to visit alumni, to attend his students' ordinations, and to speak and teach. His engagements took him across the country and again abroad, to countries including Australia, Georgia, Romania, Uganda, and others where he worked to form partnerships and promote the work of the seminary and press, and to see what he could do to make seminary education more accessible to prospective students abroad.

It was on his travels, and is still, where Fr Chad says he finds sources of refreshment and continued motivation.

"Even before announcing retirement, people had been asking me about my legacy. The only legacy I'm really concerned about has been achieved, and that is what I see when I'm out on the road: I see so many good and effective priests and pas-

tors. That's how the Church is going to continue to be served, in very, very challenging times. I've had a small hand in the formation of some outstanding priests. That's all the legacy I need."

Hearing these words from the mouth of Fr Chad wasn't a surprise to me at all, as a graduate of the seminary myself under his guidance and later a member of his staff for many years. Anyone who has spent time with him knows innately this is what he cares deeply about. But somehow I was still struck by his passion, still visible in his eyes and evident in the tone of voice, for his seminarians, his alumni, and the Church. Even after all these years, years filled with exhaustion and labors, and of course many disappointments along with the many successes.

And in true Fr Chad fashion, he wouldn't let me leave without doing the thing that is so like him. I had come to interview him during his last days as the leader of the seminary, but he turned the tables on me.

"Before you leave," he said, "there was something I wanted to ask you. What are your plans for the future? How is your family?"

After talking a good while about myself—which is not what I intended at all to happen when I first arrived in his office—I finally did leave, asking for Fr Chad's prayers and feeling guilty for taking up even more of his time. And then, having held it

together in his presence, I finally stopped holding back the tears welling up in my own eyes.

Fr Chad, your students, your spiritual children, your colleagues, and all who love you here at St Vladimir's as well as those who are far off working in the vineyard of the Lord will miss you dearly. We knew this day had to come eventually, but it still feels far, far too soon.

May Almighty God grant to His archpriest, the Very Rev. Dr Chad Hatfield, Mka Thekla, their sons Jason and Sean, their daughters-in-law Kasey and Maggie, and their grandchildren Ryan, Morgan, and Braedon many years in Fr Chad's well-earned retirement!

Faculty Spotlight

Dr Peter Bouteneff

Dr Peter Bouteneff, longtime Professor of Systematic Theology at St Vladimir's Seminary, has touched thousands across the American Orthodox world and beyond through his books, podcasts, and work in the sacred arts. He spent the past academic year on sabbatical, traveling to Oxford University as a guest scholar, giving lectures in Estonia and South Korea, and writing a new book on Eastern and Oriental Orthodox relations.



Q: Dr Bouteneff, how would you describe your background in the Orthodox Church and with St Vladimir's Seminary? What or who do you feel shaped and formed you along the way?

Dr Bouteneff: I feel extremely fortunate that throughout my youth, there were many in my family's circle who were deeply involved in the Church, as intelligent, reflective people, immersed in the arts and culture. My closest family and those around them were of that world of Russians exiled to Paris—so, Fr Schmemann, Fr Meyendorff, Sophie Koulomzin, Nicholas Arseniev, and then the next generation. So Christ and the Church were natural subjects for me, nothing artificial, nothing "churchy" in the sticky sense of that word. These folks were so level-headed about their identity: loving the best of Russia but with a critical distance, loving Orthodoxy

but without an "Orthodox agenda" as such. Their priority was genuine Christian life. Orthodoxy was simply the natural outflow of that—especially through the Liturgy.

Q: Say something about your teaching at St Vladimir's Seminary, in "dogmatic"—or is it "systematic" theology?

Dr Bouteneff: Yes, when I arrived here it was called "Dogmatic Theology," but at some point we started using the term "systematic," which is simply the method by which we teach the dogmas: systematically—topic by topic—like St John of Damascus and others did. This is how we human beings process large topics: one by one. You can't say everything at once. So you consider, in turn, God, His Son, His Spirit, the Church, the Human Person, redemption, etc. And of course, all those subjects are interrelated, and more importantly they all have their center in the person of Jesus Christ. But anyway these are still dogmatic theology courses.

Q: How will you approach teaching this topic to a broader audience in this summer's online course, "Introduction to Theology" with the St Vladimir's Online School of Theology?

Dr Bouteneff: This course will answer some fundamental questions about theology—what it is, how it's possible, what it is for. Because theology is much more than "the study of God." It is a relationship with God, where we seek to know Him, in love, in prayer, and—yes—through study. So I will talk about how it may be possible to speak about the unspeakable God, and why it matters. I'll introduce

the sources that we draw upon in our pursuit of theological understanding. In all this I will try to give a clear sense of how all this is done within the tradition of the Orthodox Church.

Q: What can you tell us about the book you've been writing this year on sabbatical?

Dr Bouteneff: The new book is on a subject I care very deeply about; namely, the theological reconciliation between Eastern and Oriental Churches. I was first "caught" by that issue during my stint at the World Council of Churches, where the two families have a common Orthodox voice. And then here at St Vladimir's Seminary, where we are so richly blessed to have students from Eastern Orthodox Churches as well as from the Indian, Coptic, Armenian, Syrian, and sometimes also Ethiopian and Eritrean Churches. Even as we feel the pain of being out of sacramental communion, we are constantly experiencing the communion of our history, faith, and worship. Living, studying, and praying side by side in our community is a powerful witness of that unbroken connection. So in the book I'm revisiting early history through the lens of what divided us and what can unite us. I hope that this will help build further confidence in the possibility of our restored sacramental communion.

Q: What other projects and opportunities have you enjoyed over the past year?

Dr Bouteneff: I have been having an enormously productive and restorative sabbatical year! During the autumn months, I spent two weeks in South Korea traveling with my wife and daughter, but also visiting

Metropolitan Ambrosius and giving a lecture on Orthodoxy at Seoul National University. That was followed by ten weeks in Cambridge, UK, together with my wife Patricia, as a fellow of the Institute of Orthodox Christian Studies in Cambridge, during which time I got a lot of my basic research and writing done for my book. There were some events in New York related to the Institute of Sacred Arts that I direct, notably a private tour of the Africa & Byzantium exhibit at the Metropolitan Museum of Art, led by our student Jaime Rall, who was interning at the museum. And I am just back from a month that began at the Sankt Ignatios College near Stockholm, where I gave a faculty seminar on my book project, and then a three-week residency at the Arvo Pärt Centre in Estonia. While there, I lived in a cabin in the Estonian forest, spending my days writing in the Centre's "Creative Room." I also gave a public lecture, entitled "The Brink of Despair and the Cup of Tea: St Sophrony and the Polarities of the Spiritual Life."

Dr Bouteneff lives just minutes on foot from campus, with his wife Patricia and their two cats. His son, Michael, works in theater production and is a touring musician, and his daughter, Elizabeth, lives and works in South Korea.

Dr Bouteneff began teaching a non-credit online course in the summer (July 9–30, 2024) offered through St Vladimir's Online School of Theology, as he addressed the question: "What is Theology?" Learn more about St Vladimir's Online School of Theology on pp. 24–25.



New Initiatives at the Institute of Sacred Arts

St Vladimir's Seminary received a Worshipping Communities Grant of \$24,630 from the Calvin Institute of Worship in January 2024. The purpose of this grant is to support a year-long process of reflection and renewal relating to Eastern Orthodox liturgical singing in the seminary's Three Hierarchs Chapel. This program is made possible by a Vital Worship, Vital Preaching Grant from the Calvin Institute of Christian Worship, Grand Rapids, Michigan, with funds provided by Lilly Endowment Inc.

Serving as project lead is **Dr Alexander Lingas**, Professor of Music and Associate Director of the Institute of Sacred Arts at St Vladimir's Seminary. He is leading an Implementation Team of seminary faculty who:

- Undertake an inventory of existing chapel musical repertories;
- Develop updated musical materials handbook for chapel use, with implementation starting in the Fall 2024 semester.

Another stated goal for the grant was already achieved in March 2024, when the Institute of Sacred Arts hosted a colloquium titled "Liturgical Music in Eastern Orthodox Theological Education."

Representatives of American and European Orthodox institutions gathered to discuss how theological visions and socio-historical realities shape the practice of liturgical singing in their chapels. The keynote address was given by the Very Rev. Prof. John Erickson, former Dean of St Vladimir's Seminary. Other speakers included the Rev Dr Romanos Karanos (Holy Cross Greek Orthodox School of Theology), Deacon Petar Kozakijević (Serbian Orthodox Church, Metropolis of Zagreb and Ljubljana), Dr Nicholas Schidlovsky (Dean of Holy Trinity Seminary, Jordanville), and Anastasia Kappanadze (St Tikhon's Orthodox Theological Seminary).

St Vladimir's Online School of Theology

Let My Prayer Arise



Beginning in February 2024, the St Vladimir's Online School of Theology offered its first continuing education class for ordained Orthodox priests. The course, "Let My Prayer Arise: Music and Hymnography of the Lenten Triodion", explored the connection between liturgical texts and music, revealing how melodies can intricately enhance the meaning of the Lenten Triodion.

This five-week online course was taught by the Rev. Dn Dr Harrison Russin, Assistant Professor of Liturgical Music at St Vladimir's Seminary. Five ordained priests were selected to participate. During the course, they encountered the profound connection between liturgical texts and music, revealing how melodies can intricately enhance the meaning of the Lenten Triodion. They also explored diverse examples throughout the weeks of Great Lent, unraveling the extraordinary interplay of language and music that adds depth and significance to the experience of parishioners participating in the services.

A course participant remarked, "The reading material was very good. Dn Russin's lectures were also extremely informative and high level. Thank you."

One of the most meaningful aspects of this course was the thoughtful conversations of the fellow clergy about how these texts impact our spiritual lives. Music calls us to hear the Word of God and to keep it in our hearts.

About Dn Harrison Russin: The Rev. Dn Dr Harrison Russin is Assistant Professor of Liturgical Music at St Vladimir's Seminary. He holds a Ph.D. in musicology from Duke University, where he wrote a dissertation on late medieval and early Renaissance settings of the Creed in the Latin Mass, focusing on monophonic and polyphonic versions. As an active Orthodox Church musician, Dn Harrison conducts the choirs at St Vladimir's Seminary and has served as a consultant for the Liturgical Music and Translations Department of the OCA. He is a St Vladimir's Seminary alumnus (M.Div. '13) and is married to Gabrielle, a 2014 M.A. alumna.

The St Vladimir's Online School of Theology, launched in June 2023, has now offered five online courses to over 700 students, with the sixth and seventh courses taking place in Summer 2024. This accessible extension of St Vladimir's Seminary is now offering our first-ever online courses for non-degree students, enabling us to offer Orthodox education to inquirers, laity, and ordained clergy all over the world.



In June 2023, Associate Professor of Patristics, the Very Rev. Dr Bogdan Bucur, taught the first course, titled "Preparing to Read the Fathers."



In July 2023, Associate Professor of Old Testament, Dr Michael Legaspi, taught the second course, "Orthodoxy & the Old Testament."



In November 2023, the third course, "Sacred Artistry: The Living Tradition of Orthodox Church Art" was taught by Associate Professor of Art History and Assistant Director of the Institute of Sacred Arts, Dr Rossitza Schroeder.



A special course, the first in the new Continuing Clergy Education initiative, was taught by Assistant Professor of Liturgical Music, the Rev. Dn Dr Harrison Basil Russin, to a select cohort of priests, on the topic "Music and Hymnography of the Lenten Triodion" in February and March 2024.



The April 2024 course, "An Introduction to Liturgical Theology," was taught by the Rev. Dn Dr Vitaly Permiakov.



June 4–25, 2024: "The Four Gospels and the One Christ: An Introduction to the New Testament Gospels" taught by Fr George Parsenios. July 9–30, 2024: "What Is Theology?" taught by Dr Peter Bouteneff.

Student Interview

In Service to God

In this student spotlight interview, we get to know Fr Peter Jared Ries (M.Div. '24). Before arriving at St Vladimir's Seminary, Fr Peter Ries spent several years working in mental health case management. Here at seminary, he has become an integral part of the community, serving as student sacristan and organizing periodic "Porch Nights" for fellow seminarians to gather on the Germack porch to talk, laugh, and sing songs together. We sat down with him for this candid conversation on his experience as an M.Div. student at St Vladimir's Seminary.

Q: Fr Peter, please tell us a bit about your background.

Fr Peter: I'm from Cleveland, OH, and for over fifteen years I have been a member of St Innocent Orthodox Church (OCA, Diocese of the Midwest). I attained a degree in psychology from Cleveland State University in 2015, and then I spent several years working in mental health case management. In this field, I assisted and treated individuals with severe mental health diagnoses, primarily those with schizoaffective and bipolar disorders. I ultimately found myself on the path to seminary, and this Midwestern boy came to the Big Apple in the Summer of 2021. My wife,


Sophie, and I met very early in my seminary journey, as she is from the area, and we were married in October of 2022. We have lived happily here on campus, in our cozy apartment surrounded by friends and faith. Sophie is a professionally trained artist specializing in illustration and design.

Q: How do you feel your educational/professional background prepared you for seminary?

Fr Peter: When you work in the field of mental health, you encounter Christ very quickly and very bluntly. I witnessed incredibly raw and incredibly human moments during my time, and crisis was a large element of my daily workload. But most importantly, I learned in that field that service to those around you was paramount to sharing the gospel. If you go out and preach to a community, but you do not serve them, it will be a hollow message falling on rightfully deaf ears. In something as secular as the social work field, I was still so poignantly aware of God's operation in my clients' lives, not through proselytizing them but rather through serving their needs in love.

Q: Why did you choose St Vladimir's Seminary?

Fr Peter: I knew early on that St Vladimir's was my choice for seminary. Archbishop Paul, of blessed memory, was very involved in my discernment process, and he was helpful in pointing me to the place where I would benefit the most on my personal journey of spiritual and professional formation. Fr Alessandro Margheritino, an alumnus of this seminary

and the current Secretary of the OCA, was my parish priest for much of my childhood, and he taught me about the resources St Vladimir's Seminary has to offer: their CPE program, the caliber of their faculty, and the advantage that all us students are learning and struggling in a very tight, very intentional community, together. Campus life was a big draw for me, and I am grateful that Sophie and I were able to start our marriage here.

Q: What is your year of study and degree program, and what have been some particularly impactful experiences during your time at the seminary?


Fr Peter: I am nearing the end of my seminary adventure as a third-year M.Div. candidate. An easy top answer to this question is my marriage to Sophie. We were able to have it at her home parish in New Jersey, attended by many seminarians, faculty, and staff. Sophie and I have always felt very cared for by the married faculty and students, and it has been so useful to be able to model their behavior as Sophie and I learn and grow together. Another memorable event was my recent ordination to the Holy Priesthood. It is a humbling obedience, and it was such a blessing to take on this responsibility

while standing alongside my colleagues, mentors, and friends.

Q: What would you like to say to supporters of the seminary?

Fr Peter: My time here is made possible by those who support this seminary, full stop. Without them, I would have never been able to come out here, I would have never had the opportunity to be formed by God through this institution. If you want to look at it in a schmaltzy way, without them I would have never found myself anywhere near New Jersey, a place where I found a beautiful and faithful woman to go on this journey with me. To those who support this seminary: thank you. Thank you for prioritizing the mission of the Church, and for helping educate the future of Orthodoxy in America and abroad. Thank you for taking the Lord's directive seriously, and truly being a light to the world.

Formation for a Life of Ministry

How the Seminary Prepared Fr Andrew Salvia for Ordained Service to the Church

Fr Andrew Salvia (M.Div. '23) serves as the Assistant Pastor at St Elias Orthodox Church in Austin, TX, under the Antiochian Archdiocese. He and his wife, Alethia, were married in 2012. They have five children, four boys and one girl, and by God's grace, are expecting another girl in June. He describes his time at St Vladimir's Seminary as the most challenging, but spiritually profitable and wonderful three years of his life.

Q: Fr Andrew, how did you discern your calling to the priesthood, and why did you choose St Vladimir's Seminary?

Fr Andrew: We suddenly lost my mother a few months before applying. The priest who received me into the Church, Fr Michael Furry, accompanied me in the ICU room when they were about to remove the life support, and he prayed with me and my family for my mother's peaceful repose. As my mother took her final breaths and we mourned her loss, I became convinced because of the example of this priest, who faithfully and without hesitation brought God's presence in the lowest point of my life, that I wanted to be able to bring Him who overcame death to others, God willing, as a priest.

I trusted my Archdiocese to send me to a place that would prepare me with the tools needed to serve God and His people. I already knew St Vladimir's Seminary had a great reputation for overall formation, not only for the students but their families, as well. The world-class SVS Press being at the forefront of publishing Orthodox Christian works in the English language was an encouragement to the type of education I would receive from the professors at the seminary. The life of the community being centered around the chapel was a very attractive quality as well. Being in

an area of the country with lots of historic Orthodox communities would give me a chance to learn how to serve people from different cultural backgrounds.

Q: What were some particularly impactful experiences during your time at seminary for you and your family?

Fr Andrew: During the summer and fall following our first year, my wife suffered a medical emergency and two miscarriages at different times. It was not something we broadcasted or widely shared, but Fr Bogdan dropped whatever he was doing to come pray with us and talk to us when he found out. Fr Chad helped us to bury the remains of the miscarried children and was a loving witness to fatherly, Christian love. Dr Tudorie brought my son a birthday present because we had to cancel his birthday celebration due to my wife's hospitalization. This is a community that truly cares.

It's hard to express how impactful it was to be surrounded by your best friends who became your brothers and sisters so effortlessly. To greet and be greeted by faculty and staff alike as if you were family was deeply impactful. We leaned on each other and spurred each other on.

Q: What are some ways your seminary formation prepared you for your current ministry?

Fr Andrew: It's the whole thing! The seminary provided an environment that allowed for the spiritual, intellectual, and emotional formation of its students by on the one hand not coddling us through every difficulty, but also not abandoning us on the other. I feel St Vladimir's Seminary did this very well by emphasizing the liturgical life in the chapel while still maintaining

high standards and expectations in the classroom. The things I experienced in seminary were a concentrated form of the daily joys and difficulties that I have so far experienced in parish life. If I couldn't learn to commit to developing spiritual disciplines, form healthy habits and boundaries, serve my family, love my neighbor, and learn to humble myself and roll up my sleeves when it wasn't always convenient, to forgive and ask forgiveness, how could I expect to survive in a parish? St Vladimir's Seminary is an intense microcosm of parish life that was absolutely indispensable for preparing me to serve at my first parish.

Q: Please say a few words of appreciation for supporters of the seminary.

Fr Andrew: Being at St Vladimir's Seminary for three years was the most challenging, but the most spiritually profitable and wonderful three years I have had the joy of experiencing. I know this would not be possible without the hard work of the faculty and staff, the commitment of the bishops of the Orthodox Church in North America, and the many financial donors and benefactors. We are so grateful to have been able to be a part of this special place and cannot thank those enough who have contributed their resources, their time, and their efforts to what the seminary has done for us.

Please continue to pray that this seminary remains a light to the world, a beacon of God's truth, and an oasis in a spiritual wasteland, and that it continues to train and raise leaders to serve the Church. The harvest truly is plentiful, but the laborers are few. I thank God and pray that St Vladimir's Seminary may continue and flourish to the glory of God.

You Are Mine is the story of what happened when I, a modern seeker, who had been willingly swallowed up by the outwardly beautiful and extremely intense elemental traditions of the ancient world in my quest for a spiritual cure, unwittingly ran into the arms of Christ, the divine Healer. I describe it as a memoir, but it is really more an account: a direct and intimate account of the inner experience of encountering the Living God and what happened in my life as a result of this meeting.

At its core, the book is an evangelical proclamation of the gospel truth that Christ alone is God, and that the Cross alone is the path to knowing and experiencing Him, and is thus intended for those who are not aware of this biblical fact. Initially, my primary purpose for writing the book was to tell all those of my former world what I had "found out," so that they too, could be released from the deception of paganism, in its myriad manifestations, and come and join me in the joy and the peace of the kingdom. Concerned as the book is with the primordial hunt of the creature for the Creator, I hope that it speaks to all those, whether inside the Church, in other Christian

contexts, or outside of either, who are burdened with the human heart's most primal urge; namely, to return home to the One from whom they came.

As well as a whistleblowing tool, the book is designed to function as an exposition of the practical reality of the unseen, and the holy responsibilities that the children of God have within it, in their roles as Christians. It is thus intended to inform and equip all believers, so that they can effectively minister to those in their care, bound up by some, or all, of the strictures from which Christ released me. Most importantly, I hope that the book can draw readers into the thing that above all else shocked me into conversion, healed me to the depths of my being, and, ultimately, transformed every single element of my life: a personal encounter with Jesus Christ and the volcanic force of His love.



St Vladimir's Theological Quarterly, Volume 66 (2022), Nos. 3–4

IONUŢ-ALEXANDRU TUDORIE, EDITOR-IN-CHIEF

The Winter 2022 issue of the *Quarterly* opens with an exegetical study of the refence to "the sign of Jonah" in the Gospel of Matthew (L. Gore-Jones). There follow two articles on Gregory of Nyssa—one on his reading of the burning bush in *Life of Moses* (T. Buijkx), the second on the relationship between humanity's creation "according to the Image" and St Gregory's use of the imagery of food and hunger (A. Fogleman/Th. Breedlove). A study of Byzantine prayers to the Theotokos ascribed to St Ephrem (M. Constas) and an analysis of Origen's pneumatology (M. Therrien) complete the patristic segment of this issue. A large article follows, comparing the insights of Sergius Bulgakov (and a number of other Orthodox theologians) and Yves Congar on the role of the Holy Spirit in the relationship between the Father and the Son (A. Vivi-

er-Mureşan). The last article deals with the ambiguous Orthodox reception of the section on Baptism in the 1982 "Lima Declaration" on Baptism, Eucharist, and Ministry (H. Majkrzak). The "Theological Essay" section of this issue contains a short, moving, and refreshing "Orthodox Creed" composed in the late 1980s by the Romanian literate, dissident, and later monastic Nicolae Steinhardt; and a consideration of the nineteenth-century Transylvanian Metropolitan Andrei Şaguna's understanding of synodality as a form of a constitutionalism, in which clergy and laity cooperate (D. Heith-Stade). Reviews of the following books round off this volume of SVTQ: Θεία Λειτουργία κατά την τάξιν εν Άθω Μονής του Βατοπαιδίου – Ιερατικόν Συλλειτουργόν (The Divine Liturgy according to the order of the Vatopedi Monastery on Athos—Hieratikon for Concelebrations) 2020 (P. Pruteanu); S. N. Bunta, The Lord God of Gods: Divinity and Deification in Early Judaism 2021 (M. Awabdi); S. Brock, trans., Isaac of Nineveh. Headings on Spiritual Knowledge (The Second Part, Chapters 1–3) 2022 (J. Scully); D. Costache, Humankind and the Cosmos: Early Christian Representations 2021 (Ch. Knight); V. Coman, Dumitru Stăniloae's Trinitarian Ecclesiology: Orthodoxy and the Filioque 2019 (P. Maican).

St Vladimir's Theological Quarterly, Volume 67 (2023), Nos. 1–2 IONUT-ALEXANDRU TUDORIE, EDITOR-IN-CHIEF

The first article of this double issue of the *Quarterly* (SVTQ 67.1–2) assesses recent scholarship on the dating of the Gospel of Mark (Andrejevs). The second article examines the Pauline understanding of conversion to Christ and living in Christ in terms of "indwelling" and "unveiling" (Fanous), while the third explores meaning of the term "Saracene-minded" as used by the Council of Hiereia (Rall); the fourth considers a late fourteenth- or early fifteenth-century Novgorodian manuscript's evidence for Byzantine monastic night prayer at the end of the ninth century (Andreev). In the fifth article, Costache argues that Orthodox theology has the resources for a much-needed engagement with science that follows in the footsteps of

Lossky, Stăniloae, and Nellas, as well as those of the Fathers. It continues with the fortieth annual Fr Alexander Schmemann Lecture (2023) by Hans Boersma, titled "God as Embodied Christology and Participation in Saint Maximus the Confessor." David Heith-Stade's theological essay provides an extended discussion of autocephaly and public law in various Orthodox contexts in the recent past. Among the book reviews, particularly noteworthy is Archimandrite Maximos Constas' critical assessment of four recently published English translations of the Septuagint Psalter. The other reviews include: Nikolaos Loudovikos, *Analogical Identities*, 2019 (Bradshaw); Dario Chiapetti, *The Father's Eternal Freedom*, 2022 (Coman); Rabee Toumi, *Orthodox Christian Bioethics*, 2020 (Vest); Natal'a Bonetskaia, "Tretii Zavet" ottsa Sergiia Bulgakova ["The Third Testament" of Father Sergius Bulgakov], 2023 (Slesinski); Cyprien Kern, L'Eucharistie, 2023 (Ladouceur).



Financials

Fiscal Year 2023: July 1, 2022–June 30, 2023

Thanks to the ongoing commitment to financial accountability and transparency of our staff and trustees, the 2023 financial audit of St Vladimir's Seminary marked sixty years of consistently clean financial audits.

A Word about Finances: It is no secret that over the last four years, the seminary has engaged in a comprehensive assessment regarding the current location of the seminary and its possible relocation to a less expensive area that would provide adequate and affordable space for the seminary to expand and preserve its historical legacy and mission. In 2022, the Board of Trustees approved the use of unrestricted funds to make necessary hires in order to increase advancement, tuition, and SVS Press revenues. That decision negatively impacted this year's operating budget. However, the seminary, having made those investments, is now positioned to work toward the goal of a balanced budget by fiscal year 2026.


