Degrees That Serve the Church

At St. Vladimir's Seminary, each degree program forms servant-leaders equipped to carry the Gospel into the world. Whether through preaching, teaching, counseling, singing, or writing, our graduates are united by one mission: to serve Christ and His Church. These paths may differ, but each offers a transformative journey—shaping the students and preparing them to serve the world they are called to reach.

The Master of Divinity is a professional graduate degree that prepares students for ministry in the Orthodox Church, especially priestly ordination. It also equips graduates for other church roles, chaplaincy (with CPE certification), or further theological study.

The Master of Arts is a two-year residential program offering a broad study of Orthodox theology, designed to deepen understanding of the Church's teachings, history, worship, and life. It provides a strong foundation for lay theological study within a worshiping academic community.





2024–2025 SVOTS Impact Report

The Doctor of Ministry is a graduate program for Orthodox clergy and pastoral leaders seeking to deepen their ministry through advanced study and spiritual formation. Combining academic rigor with pastoral practice, it equips students to serve with greater insight, compassion, and effectiveness in sharing the Gospel.



32 students enrolled/completed **CPE** this academic year

Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE) at St. Vladimir's Seminary is a 400-hour, ACPE-accredited program where students engage in supervised ministry with people in crisis—in parishes, prisons, and hospitals. Through hands-on experience, reflection, and feedback, they deepen their self-awareness, grow in compassion, and develop the pastoral skills needed to serve a suffering world with the light of Christ.

"The grace of daily services in which we can tangibly experience everything we are learning this is paramount. Going out into the world and spreading the Gospel and all we have learned truly becomes the fulfillment of that knowledge.

The richness of diversity we have here on campus represents 'extra credit' classes that cannot be measured by any academic or formal means, or by any unit of measurement. What we tend to forget is that our true unit of measure is Christ Himself—in other words, the amount of love we have for our neighbor. And it's important to understand that there is no one who is not our neighbor."

- Byzantine Art Icon: Henry Maguire delivered the annual Schmemann Lecture, followed by a campus colloquium with senior scholars and artists.
- New Book Series: *Rethinking Sacred Arts,* co-edited by Peter Bouteneff and Christina Maranci, launches the new Sacred Arts series.
- Global Music Exchange: A Calvin Worship Grant expanded our choral repertoire through international Orthodox collaboration.
- New Course: Creation in the Church's Art and Theology explored nature and sacred beauty, team-taught by Drs. Bouteneff and Schroeder.
- On the Horizon: 2026 will spotlight sacred arts across Eastern and Oriental traditions.

- "Can't You Catch Hold of Me?" (Fall 2024) revealed Christ's presence in Scripture and poetry, drawing on the poetics of divine revelation.
- Catechist Certification (Sept. 2024–May 2025): A new, year-long program launched to train lay catechists in theology, pedagogy, and pastoral practice, in collaboration with parish clergy.








Biblical Piety and Prayer Patrick Henry Reardon



Financials Fiscal Year 2024: July 1, 2023-June 30, 2024

Once again, the financial audit of St. Vladimir's Seminary's books and records resulted in an unqualified opinion. The hard work and dedication of the trustees and staff of the Seminary made this possible. Not only was the audit successful, but a favorable review by the Association of Theological Schools (ATS) was received based upon the improved outlook for the future of the finances of the Seminary.

Fiscal Year 2024 can be characterized as a year of transition for the Seminary. The Seminary saw a decrease in Unrestricted Support and Revenue, and an increase in Total Expenses when compared to the previous Fiscal Year. Changes have been implemented during the first half of Fiscal Year 2025 that have increased Support and Revenue and decreased Expenses, which is why the ATS gave us a favorable review. The goal remains to have a balanced budget in place by Fiscal Year 2027.






